How can you make a difference?

The Earth Team needs a variety of people with diverse skills and talents. As an Earth Team volunteer, you can help professional conservationists put conservation practices on the land. You could also help improve wildlife habitat or inventory natural resources.

Who can volunteer?

You must be 14 years of age or older and interested in conserving natural resources. You can work part-time or full-time, evenings or weekends, and outdoors or in a local NRCS office.

How do you sign up?

The Earth Team is now recruiting at more than 3,000 locations across the country — that means that the Earth Team is at work near you!

Becoming an Earth Team volunteer is easy! Stop in at your local NRCS office. The address and phone number can usually be found in the U.S. Government section of your phone book under USDA or Natural Resources Conservation Service.

You can also call 1-888-LANDCARE (888-526-3227) or send an e-mail to landcare@usda.gov. Be sure to provide your name, address, and phone number.
